Start with a prayer. Then it is important to read the Bible passage before proceeding. The authors of these devotional messages assume that the Bible passages will have been read first, because the messages refer back to the Bible passage on the daily devotional page. Then reflect on what you have read and end with a prayer. It is a five-step process: Pray, read the Bible passage, read the message for that day, reflect and discuss, then close with a prayer. It is our hope that this devotional booklet will be a blessing to you each day of Lent. As you read each daily page, remember that you are connected to the author of each page through the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

About This Booklet: This year we once again reached out to members and friends of The Little Church on the Prairie and Lakewood*grace* to write a page for this booklet. Our theme for this year is: **SOJOURNERS.** During Lent the pastors will be emphasizing through the sermons that we are really voyagers passing through this life to the next. They will be using the stories about Abraham.

It is hoped that each contributor to this booklet will gain from the experience. It is also hoped that each person who uses this booklet will be moved to a deeper relationship with Jesus, will become a better disciple, and will be motivated to bring the good news of Jesus to others, showing the love of Jesus to all. It is also hoped that you will, through these devotional pages, receive a better understanding of the meaning of Lent and Easter.

About the Lenten Season: The term "Lent" comes from an Old English word that means springtime. The Lenten season is a time for spiritual preparation for Easter by remembering the suffering, death, and resurrection of Christ. Lent is the period between Ash Wednesday and Easter. The Lenten spiritual disciplines such as prayer, alms giving, and fasting are meant to help us realize our dependency on God for everything and to prepare our hearts to hear what God will say to us. May our Lord bless your spiritual journey this Lenten season.

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Ash Wednesday, March 2, 2022

JESUS STARTS HIS MINISTRY

READ: Isaiah 61:1-2; Luke 4:14-21

OPENING PRAYER: Dear Heavenly Father, open the eyes of our heart so that we can increase in wisdom and knowledge. Help us to be able to see Christ as he is truly revealed in scripture. Amen.

MEDITATION: After forty days of fasting and the three temptations from Satan, Jesus started his public ministry in Galilee. He read from the Old Testament that foretells the coming Messiah.

This incident is extremely wonderful and remarkable for a number of reasons. First, Christ read Isaiah 61:1-2a indicating that he was the chosen one, the anointed one from God. Second, Jesus stated that he was sent by God to bring the message of salvation to the poor, to heal, and to liberate the hearts and souls of people. Interestingly, Jesus broke off reading in the middle of a sentence. This indicates that Christ came the first time to fulfill the Messiah's prophecy of salvation. The remainder of the sentence is concerning the Messiah's second coming. Jesus came to give us hope and salvation to all who choose to believe in and follow him.

We are still living in the wonderful day of that gospel. The question for all of us is, do we really believe in him whom God has sent? Do we trust fully in Jesus' ability to save us, to forgive our sins, to renew our spirit, and to give us hope and courage? Do we rely on the Holy Spirit to lead and comfort us, even as we encounter the sometimes dreadful and significant storms of life?

CLOSING PRAYER: Lord, you promised that you have not given us the spirit of fear, but of power, love, and sound mind. Your promises never fail! We claim that promise. Amen.

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GOD KNOWS ME

READ: Psalm 139

CLOSING PRAYER: Search me, O God, and know my heart! Try me and know my thoughts! See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting. (Psalm139:23-24). Amen.

READ: Philippians 1:9-11

CLOSING THOUGHT: Paul showed his love for the Philippians by praying for them. He prayed that they would grow and mature in their walk with God. You can pray for people you love too and strive to show the unconditional love of God.

READ: Proverbs 3:21-26

We gain wisdom when we experience God's presence in our lives.

CLOSING PRAYER: Lord, thank you for walking with me and giving the gift of wisdom, to guide me and assure me in only the ways you can. Amen.

READ: Mark 1:1-8

CLOSING PRAYER: Dear Lord, it is so easy to use any excuse to wait for the "right time" to accept you whole-heartedly into our lives. Help us to live our lives like John the Baptist proclaimed, so that others will see by our example that waiting to accept Jesus is not a good option. Amen.

In short, we learned how Jesus serves as a model of faith, a warning of doubt, a lesson of spiritual discernment, and a testimony of the power of our savior to change lives, heal, forgive sins, and grant eternal life, lessons that apply to us each and every day.

CLOSING PRAYER: Thank you, Lord, for your forgiveness, even when there are times when we may have our doubts. But through you, all things are possible. Amen.

CLOSING PRAYER: As sojourners with Christ, let our hearts be filled with love and goodness so his light shines through us. We pray in his precious name. Amen.

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MOST HIGH GOD AND ALMIGHTY LORD

READ: Psalm 91

OPENING PRAYER: Life is hard, but God, you are so good. Dear Father, draw us nearer to you and increase our faith. In Jesus' name. Amen.

MEDITATION: Journeying with God is often "painfully good." In 2020 a deep depression, loneliness, panic, and fear filled me after I placed my husband in long-term care due to his Alzheimer's disease. For the first time I truly clung to the Almighty because I had no-one else to hold onto.

Alzheimer's dementia is not a journey for the faint-of-heart and I wouldn't wish it on anyone; however, neither would I avoid it. Alzheimer's forced me to choose between fear and embracing the unknown. I chose to trust God, to abide in his shadow as my fortress against fear. By doing so, the depression and loneliness were replaced with peace and joy.

Living with dementia, cancer, or COVID is like diving into the deep end of the unknown. You're not in control, and that feels scary; trust God with the unknown, for it is not unknown to him. Abide in God so that the "painfully good" journey is worthwhile.

The path for each of us is a little different. But try to be courageous in your challenges and stay in the Word, and I believe you will find strength and encouragement.

OUR UNITY IS IN CHRIST

READ: 1 Corinthians 3:1-15

OPENING PRAYER: Dear Lord, we are prone to division and quick to compare. Open our eyes to see your image in one another as you conform us to the image of Christ. Amen.

MEDITATION: It's amazing how much our culture is driven by personalities and popularity. This can creep into the church as well. The Corinthian church apparently fell victim to this with Paul, Peter, and Apollos, none of whom likely encouraged it in any way. Perhaps we gravitate toward those we perceive as likeminded, perhaps to smooth orators, perhaps to those who simply already have a following. And we love to think of ourselves as superior, as being on the "winning team." But when divisions arise within the church that set believer against believer, our witness to the world suffers greatly. But if we are in Christ at all, we are one in Christ, for Christ cannot be divided. We may disagree, we may emphasize different gifts and ministries, but we are always only one in Spirit. For you see, we don't come to Christ in unity and agreement. We come to him in division and brokenness. And Christ himself draws us to himself and we become one in him. He alone is the source and the substance of our unity, not uniformity: For God loves our diversity, after all, he created it! He loves community and interdependence. As we draw closer to Christ, inevitably we draw closer to one another. This is a winsome witness - and a joy to God!

CLOSING PRAYER: Lord Jesus, you alone are both the source and substance of our community. Draw us closer to you, and thereby closer to one another, and may our unity be your glory. Amen.

READ: Mark 8:34-38

When we follow the way of the cross, we are often in direct opposition to the way of the world. Denying ourselves means a lot more than giving up something we really enjoy for Lent. Giving up chocolate or coffee is a lot easier than losing a friend, our job, or being sued. If all we have is this world, it doesn't really make any sense, right? But that's not where it ends. The Greek word used in this passage means either "life" or "soul"; while our life here will end eventually, our soul is saved in Jesus. Thank you, Jesus!

CLOSING PRAYER: Lord, give me courage to stand up for you and your words in the world today. I can't do this without your strength. Thank you for caring for me. Amen.

READ: Psalm 51

One person asks a silly question such as, "Would you rather have to wear only purple for the rest of your life, or have to wear the same single outfit every day forever?", or "Would you rather have the beak of an ostrich, or the feet of a penguin?" Then each person takes turns answering and explaining why they chose their answer. For us it's a game that keeps us laughing and thinking creatively. But in reading Psalm 84, we're reminded that the Bible has several of its own more serious "would-you-rathers." Would you rather live one day in God's courts, or 1,000 elsewhere? Would you rather be a doorkeeper in God's house, or dwell in the tents of the wicked?

Psalm 84 describes a final home so beautiful, so comfortable, so peaceful that it's worth the work, the wait, and the sacrifice. This house of the Lord is worth giving up the comforts and lifestyle of this world. The word used to describe the pathway to this destination is "pilgrimage", which is no easy walk, but a long and tiring journey. May we not give up on our journey or settle for anything less than the courts of the Lord!

CLOSING PRAYER: Lord God, blessed is the one who trusts in you. Help us to choose your courts each day. A life with you is worth more than anything this world has to offer us. Fulfill the yearning of our hearts for an eternity spent with you. In your name we pray. Amen.

Good Friday, April 15, 2022

THAT'S NOT FAIR!

READ: Isaiah 53:4-5 (better yet, just read the entire chapter!)

OPENING PRAYER: For our sake, Lord, we thank you that life is not fair. We have so little to offer, and you have so much to give. Thank you for your mercy. Amen.

MEDITATION: Have you ever wondered why life seems so unfair sometimes? You're trying so hard, you've been so nice, and because of somebody else's negligence, you get the short end of the stick. "Life is not fair!" we protest.

Sometimes, we even have the nerve to blame God when we think life is unfair.

Can we talk about fairness for a moment?

Take a minute and read Isaiah 53:4-5. This is one of the "Suffering Servant" passages; one of a number of Isaiah's passages that tells of the suffering that Jesus will endure. Understand that this passage is *explicitly* referring to Jesus, and notice what Jesus receives: pain, suffering, punishment, and affliction. He is pierced (John 19:24), crushed, and wounded.

Now look at who is responsible: "Surely, he took up *our pain,* and bore *our suffering...* he was pierced for *our transgressions*, he was crushed for *our iniquities....*"

CLOSING THOUGHT: Look back at what Jesus received again, and compare that to what we receive: peace and healing. He gets all that, and *we* get peace and healing in exchange? Do you suppose our sense of justice had any say in this exchange...?

REDEEMING SHEPHERD

READ: 1 Peter 2:21- 25

OPENING PRAYER: Dear God, thank you that you are in and with us in our suffering. Amen.

MEDITATION: First Peter is a letter written by the apostle Peter to believers in Asia Minor (modern day Turkey). Christians at that time (about 62-64 A.D.) were under threat of persecution because they refused to give worship to Caesar. Peter writes that believers should live moral and godly lives as a witness to unbelievers even in the midst of suffering. Peter writes, "Live such good lives among the pagans that though they accuse you of doing wrong, they may see your good deeds and glorify God..." (1Peter 2:12 NIV.)

In our passage, Peter points to Jesus as our example in suffering. Jesus entrusted himself "to him who judges justly" and so can we. Peter points out that Jesus' suffering secured our salvation and that he cares for and protects us as Shepherd and Overseer of your souls." (1 Peter 2:25 NIV.) It is also worth noting that Peter quoted phrases from Isaiah 53 in the passage showing that he saw Jesus as the suffering Servant/Messiah figure depicted there.

CLOSING PRAYER: Dear Lord, few, if any of us, will ever suffer for our faith like those First Century Christians or the many believers today living under persecution. Help us live and act in ways that show your love to people and give you the glory. Amen.

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THE RESURRECTION: THE ABSOLUTE GAME CHANGER

READ: Mark 16:1-8

OPENING PRAYER: Father, thank you for the gift of eternal life through the death and resurrection of your Son, Jesus Christ. Thank you for doing for us what we could not do on our own. Amen.

MEDITATION: As horrific, horrendous, and torturous as the death of Jesus was on the cross, there is nothing unique about his death on the cross. On the day that Jesus was crucified, the gospel writers tell us that there were at least two others crucified with him. Historians tell us that, under Roman rule, the Romans crucified thousands upon thousands of people.

That Jesus died is not unique. Every human being who has ever lived dies. That Jesus was crucified is not unique. There were over thirty thousand who died such a death. But only one person in all of history ever conquered death and rose again from the grave!

The death of Jesus on the cross was unlike any other crucifixion and any other death. What makes the death of Jesus unique? The resurrection. The empty tomb of Easter morning changes the kind of death that Jesus died. Because of the resurrection, the death that Jesus died wasn't just dying, but a sacrificial death for all those who trust in him as Lord and Savior. Christ died on the cross for sinners so that we might rise with Christ as God's children on Easter morning.

The resurrection changes everything!

CLOSING PRAYER: Thank you, God, for sending your Son to die on our behalf. Thank you, Jesus, for your obedience and your sacrificial death. Thank you, Holy Spirit, for revealing to us the truth of the resurrection! Amen.
